The 2007-2008 school year saw many changes here at the *East Asia Law Review*, formerly the *Chinese Law and Policy Review*. Most notably, we decided to expand our focus from covering Chinese law and policy exclusively to covering law and policy in the broader East Asia region. Our new name reflects this expanded focus, and we hope as news of this expansion spreads we will attract submissions that traverse a wider range of topics and legal systems than we were previously able to address.
