Why International Justice Still Faces Roadblocks

Richard Dicker will reflect on his field experiences in international justice and the challenges that the ICC is currently facing. What does it mean that states are withdrawing from the Rome Statute? What is the impact of the investigation in Afghanistan? What are organizations currently doing to build on the road for justice in Syria? Richard's presentation will provide students an opportunity to have ears on the ground and gain first-hand views on the developments in international justice.

Richard Dicker has been the Director of Human Rights Watch's International Justice Program since its founding in 2001; he began his work at Human Rights Watch in 1991.

Dicker led a multi-year campaign by Human Rights Watch to establish the International Criminal Court (ICC). He continues to be closely involved on issues that are important at the ICC. He has also spent the past few years leading advocacy efforts urging the creation of effective accountability mechanisms.
